3rd January 1920

Extract from The Fife News: Review of Chief Events in 1919 – "After last year's New Year festivities were over, the village was very quiet, unless for the welcoming home from time to time of our returned prisoners of war. In March, the St John's Masonic Lodge and the Lomond Oak Lodge held their annual dances – the first for five years. On 14th April a meeting, with a view to raising funds for a war memorial was held in the Town Hall. An Institute was decided upon. On 24th May the annual "market", which had been in abeyance for the last four years, was held in the Loan. Dr J.G. Jack, who had been medical practitioner in the district for the past 17 years, left the town in July to take up a practice in Cathcart, Glasgow. He was succeeded by Dr W.H. Shand. To celebrate the signing of peace, sports for the children were held in the grounds of Falkland House, and a fancy dress parade took place at night. A garden fete, in aid of the war memorial, was held in the Palace Grounds on 23rd July. The drawings amounted to about £80. In August, Mr Wm. Robb, headmaster of the Public School, left to fill the headmastership of Kinross Public School. On 4th September, a garden fete, organised by the Hon. Mrs A. Maule Ramsay, was held in the grounds of Falkland House in aid of Lord Roberts Memorial Workshops. Over £120 was drawn. A sale of work in aid of church purposes was held in the grounds of the U.F. Church on 6th September. In the short space of a few hours, £74 was realised. Quite a surprise was felt in the town when the old-established firm of Messrs Charles Jackson & Sons (Ltd.) sold their Pleasance Linen Works and St John's Floorcloth Works on 25th October to the Scottish Co-operative Wholesale Society (Ltd.), Glasgow. On 7th November, the Rev. J.K. Russell, of the Parish Church, who had been serving as a chaplain to H.M. Forces, returned, bringing with him a bride. Mr Nisbet, late headmaster of Springfield Public School, started duties on 25th November as headmaster of the Public School here."

Extract from The Fife News: **Measles** – "There is an outbreak of measles in the town, but so far all the cases have been of a very mild type."

Extract from The Fife News: **Service** – "The Rev. J.K. Russell held a short service in the Parish Church on Christmas evening. There was a good attendance. A service

of praise was held in the Parish Church on Sunday evening. The choir, under the leadership of Mr Spence, rendered a few Christmas carols."

Extract from The Fife News: **Christmas Treat** – "As has been her custom for a good few years back, the Hon. Mrs Maule Ramsay gave the children attending the Public School a Christmas treat in the Drill Hall on Tuesday evening. The children did ample justice to a good tea purveyed by Mr W. Strudley. With songs and recitations by the children, a very enjoyable evening was spent. Among those present were: -

10th January 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Measles** – "Owing to an outbreak of measles among the young folks, the Public School has not been re-opened after the Christmas and New Year holidays."

Extract from The Fife News: **Service** – "The New Year was ushered in here very quietly. The Rev. J.K. Russell conducted a watchnight service in the Established Church. There was a fair attendance."

Extract from The Fife News: **Kirk Session** – "The Kirk Session, through the generosity of a few friends, have been able to distribute quantities of coal to the deserving poor of the town. The gift was very much appreciated by the recipients."

Extract from The Fife News: **Accident** – "An unfortunate accident befell Dr Shand last week. While going his rounds, his horse became restless and bolted, throwing the doctor out of the machine. He sustained a dislocated shoulder and a few cuts about the face. The doctor is progressing favourably."

17th January 1920

Extract from The Fife News: War Memorial Concert – "A concert, organised by Mr Anderson, Allan Park, in aid of the funds of the war memorial was held in the Drill Hall on Thursday evening last week. Songs were sung by Miss Staig, Leven, the Misses Henderson, Kirkcaldy, Misses C. Peggie and L. Finlay, and Mr John Ross. A pleasing feature of the entertainment was the dancing of the Irish jig and the Highland fling by Misses Lizzie and May Gavin. Miss Edmiston and Miss Gavin played the accompaniments. The sum of over £5 was realised."

Extract from The Fife News: **Death – Reekie –** "At Balmblae, Falkland (house of her son), Catherine Seath, aged 87, widow of Ambrose Reekie, late of Cupar."

24th January 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Death – Sutherland –** "At Falkland, suddenly, on the 19th inst., Jean Sandison, second daughter of the late Thomas Sutherland and of Mrs Sutherland."

7th February 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Appeal** – "As the result of an appeal for "The Save the Children" fund, a sum of over £11 was collected at the door of the Parish Church on Sunday morning."

Extract from The Fife News: **Treat** – "The congregational Committee of the Parish Church entertained the children of the church to a treat in Mr Hardie's Temperance Hotel on Saturday afternoon. Lime-light illustrations of Jerusalem were very much enjoyed by the children, and with song, etc., a very enjoyable afternoon was spent."

Extract from The Fife News: Colonel Sir Alexander Sprot's Meeting – "Colonel Sir Alexander Sprot, C.M.G., M.P. for East Fife, addressed a well-attended meeting in the Town Hall on Wednesday night – Provost Jackson in the chair. The ladies were out in strong force, and the meeting was very interesting. The member gave reasons why the Coalition Government should still be supported. Many things yet remained to be done in connection with the settlement and reconstruction of the affairs of the country owing to the aftermath of the war. Criticising Mr Asquith's Paisley speeches, the Colonel said East Fife had rejected Mr Asquith after full consideration of the ex-Premier's war record, which showed laxity in the carrying out of courageous measures, and savoured too much of the "wait and see" policy. (Hear, hear, and applause). No questions were asked at the conclusion of the speech, and the meeting was brought to a close by Sir Alexander calling for a vote of thanks to the Provost for presiding."

14th February 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Death – Herd –** "At High Street, Falkland, on the 5th inst., Colin Herd, grocer and provision merchant, aged 65 years."

21st February 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Masonic Assembly** – "Lodge St John No. 35 held their annual assembly in the Drill Hall on Friday evening. The hall was beautifully decorated for the occasion. Between 60 and 70 couples took part in the "grand march", which was led off by Past-Master Robt. Sharpe and Mrs John Drysdale. Delegates from Lodge St Cyre, Lodge Rothes, and Lodge King Robert de Bruce were present. The music was supplied by Mr Adamson's band from Kingskettle. Bros. Schofield, Gould and Walker acted as M.C.'s. It is interesting to note that Bro. Sharpe is the oldest Freemason in Scotland. Although 92 years of age, he enjoys the best of health, and is still able to do his little bit in his garden."

28th February 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Falkland Curling Club** – "The annual dinner of the Curling Club, which used to be one of the principal events of the winter season in the ancient Royal burgh, had, like the game itself, almost been relegated as a function of the past during the war. A little fresh life has shown itself in spite of the sparse favour of "John Frost", and on Friday evening in the Bruce Arms Hotel, there sat down to a sumptuous repast, provided by Mr and Mrs Strudley, a representative number of the Club, along with two delegates from Stratheden and new members. The President, Mr Alex. Shanks, proved himself to be a most genial host in the chair,

and with toasts and songs, the evening passed most pleasantly. Six of the new members were put through the tests of initiation, and each of them contributed to the programme, which shows that "My Lord" had not been exceptionally severe."

Extract from The Fife News: Farmer's Horseplay – "John McCathie, farmer, Myreside, parish of Falkland, pleaded guilty, at Cupar Sheriff Court on Tuesday, before Sheriff Dudley Stuart, of having, on 26th January, in a shop and house at Newton of Falkland, committed an indecent assault on a young woman. Mr J.L. Anderson, who appeared for the accused, said he thought he would be able to satisfy the Sheriff that the charge was altogether outside the ordinary category of such cases. His client had known this woman for over 20 years, and during that time had been on terms of intimacy with her. He had, in fact, asked her to marry him but she would not accept his proposal. He had a little liquor on the date libelled, and what took place was really a bit of horseplay. The Procurator-Fiscal said the woman was a very respectable person, and highly esteemed in Newton of Falkland. It was quite true that the accused had been making overtures to her, but she rejected them, and in point of fact went in great terror of him. The Sheriff, in imposing a fine of £10 or in default 30 days' imprisonment, and putting the accused on £10 caution for a year, with a similar alternative of imprisonment, said it was not tolerable that a respectable woman should be treated in this way."

6th March 1920

Mr John Baillie, Bank House, occupied the chair. The play, 'Redcap in Fairyland' was very much enjoyed by the large audience. Solos, recitations, step-dancing, signalling club swinging, and bar-bell exercises, were also much admired. Miss Reekie presided at the piano."

Extract from The Fife News: **United Free Church** – The annual congregational social was held in the church on Friday evening – the Rev. J.P. Batchelor in the chair. There was a good attendance. Addresses were given by Rev. J.K. Russell, Falkland, Rev. J.M. Rose, Auchtermuchty, and the Rev. W. Hamilton, Gauldry. A solo was sung by Miss Horne, and recitations were given by Mrs Welsh. The choir, under the leadership of Mr William Burgon, rendered several anthems. The financial report for 1919, read by Mr Anderson, showed the congregation to be in a prosperous condition."

20th March 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Bible Class** – "The members of the U.F. Church Bible Class, along with a few friends, held a most enjoyable social last Wednesday evening. With songs and games a very happy evening was spent."

Extract from The Fife News: **Public Meeting** – "A public meeting for the object of furthering the Temperance Act 1913 was held in the U.F. Church Hall on Thursday evening last week. The Rev. J.K. Russell, B.D., presided, and introduced Mr Robert

Young of the National Temperance Council of Scotland, who explained the Act in all its bearings. A local Committee was formed."

Extract from The Fife News: **Lomond Oak Lodge** – "The members of the Lomond Oak Lodge held their annual assembly in the Drill Hall on Friday evening. Between 40 and 50 couple took part in the grand march which was led off by Bro. George Hardie and Miss Hardie. The music was supplied by Mr Wm. Aird's band from Thornton. Bros. J. Hardie and J. Peggie acted as M.C.'s. The purveying was efficiently carried out by Miss Hardie, Temperance Hotel."

3rd April 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Band of Hope** – "The Band of Hope, under the leadership of Mr Spence, rendered the cantata, "Our Sweetest Singer", in the Parish Church on Sunday afternoon. The singing of solos, duets, and choruses by the children earned Mr Spence much credit for his work during the winter months. Miss Edmeston presided at the organ."

10th April 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Holiday** – "Monday was observed as the Spring holiday. The shops and factories were closed for the day. A good many people left the town, but, owing to the bad weather, the visitors were few."

Extract from The Fife News: **Women's Guild** – "The members of the Parish Church Women's Guild were entertained to tea in the vestry by the Rev. J.K. and Mrs Russell at their closing meeting on Thursday. With songs and games, a very happy evening was spent."

Extract from The Fife News: **Newton of Falkland Road** – "A suggestion by Falkland Town Council that Cupar District Committee should take over the road through Newton of Falkland, after it had been put in good repair by the Town Council, was considered on Tuesday at the monthly meeting of the District Committee at Cupar. The road surveyor (Mr Boyd) said the road was in a very bad state at present. Mr George Gavin, Falkland Estate Office, said the surveyor might get an estimate of what it would cost to keep the road up, and submit it to a future meeting. This was agreed to."

17th April 1920

Extract from the Fife News: **Children** – "The children of the Parish Church Band of Hope were entertained to tea in the vestry on Saturday afternoon. The Rev. J.K. Russell presided. A very happy afternoon was spent."

(Ltd.) have purchased the property at Liquorstane, Falkland, from Mr Robert Ness, and propose to convert it into an up-to-date garage with hiring facilities. It is expected that this new Company will carry on Mr Ness's bus, passenger, and goods traffic business between Falkland and Falkland Road Station by motor vehicle."

Extract from The Fife News: Mrs Archibald Maule Ramsay – "Mrs Archibald Maule Ramsay, who has given birth to a son, will be remembered as the former Lady Ninian Crichton Stuart. Her first husband, Lord Bute's brother, was killed in action in 1915, and about two years later, his widow married Captain Archibald Maule Ramsay, a Coldstream Guardsman, and a relative of the Earl of Dalhousie, and the husband of Lady Patricia Ramsay. The marriage aroused considerable interest at the time, the bridegroom being fully ten years junior of his bride, and the couple having met when Captain Ramsay was recovering at House of Falkland. There are three children of Mrs Ramsay's first marriage, and this is the second child of the second marriage."

12th June 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Failure to Report Case of Parasitic Mange** – "John Young, crofter, Myreside, Falkland, pleaded guilty at Cupar Sheriff Court on Tuesday, before Sheriff Dudley Stuart, of having, on 26th March, had in his possession and under his charge, a brown mare which was affected or suspected to be affected, with parasitic mange, and that he failed to notify this to the authorities. Mr T.W. Davidson, solicitor, Cupar, said accused was unaware that the horse had

mange. He was a chauffeur, and had not very much knowledge of horses, and he did not know the horse was suffering from this complaint. He would not have failed to notify the authorities if he had known of the character of the disease from which the horse was suffering. The offence was the result of ignorance on his part. A fine of 40s was imposed."

26th June 1920

10th July 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Choir Drive** – "The members of the Parish Church Choir had their annual drive on Saturday. The weather was at its best, and the journey to Dunfermline, by way of Kinross, was very much enjoyed by all."

17th July 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **Pic-nic** – "The children of the Established Church had their annual outing on Saturday afternoon. They were conveyed in carts, kindly lent by the farmers of the district, to Pitlour. The weather was at its best, and the children

had a most enjoyable afternoon. The children on the United Free Church also had their pic-nic on the lawn outside the church."

24th July 1920

Extract from The Fife News: **School Holidays** – "The Public School closed down on Friday for the summer vacation for five weeks."

Extract from The Fife News: **Visitors** – "The town has quite a busy appearance this week, the visitors being very numerous. Unfortunately the weather is very uncertain."

Extract from The Fife News: **Scouts** – "The Leven Boy Scouts are camping out this week in the Triangle Park. They attended the service in the Established Church on Sunday morning, and the Kirkcaldy Girl Guides, who are billeted at Newton of Falkland, attended service in the United Free Church."

Article in The Fife News: Sale of Work at Falkland Palace In Aid of War Memorial:

"On Wednesday, under favourable weather conditions, a successful sale of work was held in the historic grounds of Falkland Palace, in aid of the funds of Falkland War Memorial, which is to take the form of an institute to promote social intercourse and recreation in Falkland. About £1,000 has been already collected, and the Committee have fixed upon a site. At the sale of work on Wednesday, £95 was drawn.

Falkland's Past and Future

Mr J.W. Jackson, Meadowfield, presided, and introduced Sir William Robertson, Lord Lieutenant of Fife, who declared the sale open. Sir William said Falkland had an interesting and splendid history. Their boys had gone out from them – some of them had come back – some of them had not. To the broken family circles of those heroes there was no need for a memorial. They could never forget their own boys. They were needed, and they went there. They in Falkland that day had also their parts to play. They were there to gather money for a memorial which would be worthy of the men and boys of Falkland who gave up their lives in the great battle for freedom. To be in any way associated with the spirit which burned within the lads who fell was a privilege they should feel proud to be under. Falkland had had an interesting past. There was no reason why it should not have an interesting future.

That depended upon the spirit of the people, and that spirit would have to be a spirit of service, a spirit of self-sacrifice.

"The return match between the above teams took place at Duffus Park, Cupar, on Wednesday night, and proved the best exhibition of lightening scoring seen in Cupar this year. Cupar batted first, but the deliveries of Croall and J. Robertson were too hot for the opening men, and three wickets were down for 34. Innes and Robertson brightened up matters, and scoring became very fast. Innes registered his 50 shortly after the century was telegraphed, and added another 33 before P. Robertson held him with a well-judged catch in the outfield. The partnership took the score to 142. Robertson continued some fine play on the offside, and the innings was declared with 153 for 5 wickets, of which he had 36.

Lindsay and Duncan are Freuchie's crack opening pair, and they soon showed they were to make a bid for the runs. Ramsay, Cupar's fast, got no assistance from the easy wicket, and had to give place to Georgeson, while Brown was replaced by Reid. Lindsay gave a finished exhibition. His driving was delightfully crisp, and he gave the finest display of late cutting that spectators have witnessed for some time. Duncan was particularly hot on the leg. He sent his first ball beautifully for 4, and added many boundary pulls. Every change in the bowling was rung without success until 95 runs were telegraphed, when Reid, when Reid beat Duncan's defence. This batsman's contribution was 58. The fielders retired to the ropes when Peter Robertson went to the wicket, and he opened with a fine drive for 4. In attempting a three run, however, he was unable to make the crease in time before Edmond lifted off the bails. Croall was out to a good catch in the outfield, and Simpson, the promising left-hander, was caught at the wicket. Dowie was held at point before he scored, and just as "time" was approaching, the Falkland total stood at 152 for 5 wickets. Lindsay soon placed the issue beyond doubt, and 162 was reached when time was called. Lindsay's innings was much enjoyed.

Without being at all reckless, he is a very fast scorer, and obtained each of his 77 runs by correct cricket. A total score of 315 in a night match of less than 2 ½ hours leaves critics with little to grumble about in cricket. Falkland's total included 16 boundaries, and Cupar's score included 17 boundaries and two sixes."

Article in *The Fife News:* Falkland's 'Ancient Hovels' – Big Scheme to Improve Housing:

"The lack of suitable housing accommodation has been a much-felt want in Falkland for some considerable time, and lately the Town Council addressed themselves in earnest to the task of remedying this all-important matter. Many of the houses in the burgh, it was contended, were out of date, and, in view of all the modern requirements which compliance with the laws of hygiene demands in dwelling-houses nowadays, the Council considered that it was incumbent on them to do something, as the lack of comfortable houses made it difficult to secure labour. Business people found themselves face to face with the fact that they could attract only a certain class of labour, when they could offer only old-fashioned houses; the better class of labour would not come to live in what was characterised as 'ancient hovels'.

Under these circumstances, the Town Council drew up a scheme by which it was proposed to renovate old properties, and this scheme was submitted to the Board of Health for their approval – and their financial assistance. The Board, however, had other views on the subject and stated definitely that they would not provide grants except for the purpose of erecting new buildings, on clean ground. This proved

rather a set-back to the Council, but acting in the belief that "he who puts his hand to the plough, etc.," they decided that failing assistance in the improvement of the old property, they would "go the whole hog", as suggested by the Board of Health, and erect "new buildings on clean ground." Having so resolved, the worthy Councillors, with their enterprising leader, Provost Jackson, did not let the grass grow under their feet. They secured a site in the Pleasance, where they mean to erect a Crescent of 40 houses, with five, four, and three rooms, and they are so advanced with their scheme that they are inviting tenders for brick work, joiner work, etc. They are also proposing to borrow the sum of £50,000 upon the security of the rates, property and revenues of the burgh for the purpose of meeting the cost of construction of those houses, which are for the working classes of the burgh.

The knowledge that Falkland has had the courage to take this step might well provide a fillip to those larger and in many respects more prosperous places in East Fife which so far have shirked the idea of tackling the housing problem. There is no vagueness in the minds of the Falkland people regarding their arrangements. They state with confidence that a commencement will be made to the building of the new houses before the end of the year. Inquiries made in Falkland as to whether the population has increased since pre-war days elicited the information that there is little difference, but that the factories are to be extended; the Scottish Co-operative Wholesale Society, who purchased the floorcloth and linen works last year, had plans before the burgh Dean of Guild Court last week for the extension of their buildings. This will inevitable mean increased business in the burgh, and it is in order to cope with this, and to bring the best possible in the labour market to the burgh, that the Town Council have launched on a scheme which deserves general support."

Payment was in respect of a horse which pursuer averred he sold to defender, but this defender denied, and explained he only accompanied William Blair, coach-hirer, Inverkeithing, to the sale to buy the horse, which later was stated to be disconform to warranty. The plea of defender was that the action was irrelevant, as the cheque had not been presented at any bank for payment. Sheriff Umpherston has sustained the first plea in law for the defender, and dismissed the action, with expenses to defender. In a note, his Lordship says the cheque had not been presented for payment, and by the provisions of the Bill of Exchange Act of 1882, the fact that the holder of a cheque has reason to believe that the bill will on presentation be dishonoured, does not dispense with the necessity for presentation. He must actually present it before he could sue for payment of the amount."
