## 5<sup>th</sup> January 1924

Extract from The Fife News: **Billiard Table** – "A half-size billiard table has been placed in the War Memorial Institute for the purpose of teaching the art to the younger members."

Extract from The Fife News: **Children** – "The children who attend the Parish and U.F. Churches were entertained and presented with gifts taken from Christmas trees erected at these churches last Friday evening."

Extract from The Fife News: **New Year Holidays** – "The linen and floorcloth factories, along with other works, closed down last Saturday for one week."

Extract from The Fife News: **New Year** – "Bringing in the New Year was very quietly observed in the village. There did not seem to be the same merry-making as has been maintained on former occasions."

Extract from The Fife News: **Coals for the Poor** – "The annual distribution of coal is being made this week to the poor in Falkland parish, also parcels of tea and other seasonable gifts, through the kindness of Mrs Gulland, Elie, late of Millfield; the Committee of the Ladies' Club, Mrs A. Maule Ramsay, and ex-Provost Jackson. The old folks appreciate the kindness of the donors in remembering them at this time of year."

Extract from The Fife News: **Vital Statistics** – "Of 31 deaths in Falkland parish during the year, 10 were persons over 70, five over 80, and one over 93 years of age. There were 32 births and 14 marriages, compared with 35 births and 12 marriages, respectively, for the previous year."

Extract from The Fife News: **Ornithological Society** – "This Society held their 57<sup>th</sup> annual show in the Drill and Town Halls on Wednesday. Although there was no caged bird section, many fine birds were exhibited in the poultry and pigeon classes. The judges were: -

Poultry, soft feather – Wm. Danchin, Glencraig

Hard feather - Jas. Delaney, Gateside.

Pigeons - Andrew Anderson, Edinburgh.

The Hain Cup, presented for the best bird in the show, and the Society's Cup for the best pigeon, were won by Messrs A. Garland, Gateside, and G. Anderson, jnr., Anstruther.

## 12th January 1924

Extract from The Fife News: **Public School** – "The Public School was re-opened on Tuesday morning, after the New Year vacation."

Extract from The Fife News: **Pulpit** – "Mr Summers, a student from St Andrews University, occupied the Parish Church pulpit on Sunday morning. Rev. Mr Anderson of Auchtermuchty conducted the afternoon service in the U.F. Church."

Extract from The Fife News: **Dance** – "As a result of the Christmas dance organised by the Ladies' Club, 36lb of tea and 72lb of sugar have been distributed amongst the deserving people in the village. One guinea was also forwarded to Perth Infirmary."

Extract from The Fife News: **Cinema** – "The big picture on Saturday evening was entitled 'Sonny', with Richard Barthelmess in the leading role. The new serial entitled 'The White Eagle', and featuring Ruth Roland, promises to be very exciting."

Extract from The Fife News: **Death** – "At Falkland Palace, Falkland, on the 8<sup>th</sup> inst., George Gavin, factor, Falkland Estate – R.I.P. Funeral on Friday, 11<sup>th</sup> inst. Service in the Palace Chapel at 1 o'clock. This is the only intimation and invitation."

Article in The Fife News: **Death of Mr George Gavin, Falkland Palace – A Highly Esteemed Factor**:

"The hand of death has been heavily laid of late on men of Fife, whom the county can ill spare. Three weeks ago it was our melancholy duty to record the unlooked-for death of Mr James E. Grosset, L.L.B., of Eden Park, Cupar. Among those present at that gentleman's funeral was Mr George Gavin, factor, Falkland Palace, and now we record with profound regret that he also has answered the inexorable call. Both men have been cut off in the prime of life, and have left blanks that will not be easily filled. Mr Gavin was 57 years of age.

Mr Gavin had been confined to his house for a fortnight, and suffered from two heart attacks during that time, but he recovered, and was thought to be progressing favourably. A severe heart attack on Tuesday evening terminated fatally.

Mr Gavin was born and educated in the city of Aberdeen. He received his early training in estate management in the office of the widely known agriculturalist, Mr Andrew Whitton of Couston of Newtyle, who was then factor on the extensive Mackenzie-Wharncliffe estates belonging to the Earl of Wharncliffe, and on the estate of Belmont, the property of the late Right Hon. Sir Henry Campbell-

Bannerman, M.P. In 1980, Mr Whitton resigned these factorships, and Mr J.W. Barty, LL.D., Dunblane, was appointed his successor as factor on the Wharncliffe estates. Mr Gavin thereupon transferred to Dunblane, and latterly became Dr Barty's principal assistant in the factorial department of an extensive business, which included the management, not only of the Wharncliffe properties, but of a large number of estates in West Perthshire and Stirlingshire. He remained 14 years in the 'Cathedral City', and in 1901 was appointed resident factor to Sir Robert Moncrieffe, Bart of Moncrieffe, Bridge of Earn. In addition to the local management of the Moncrieffe estate and Sir Robert's estate of Trinity Gask, near Crieff, he had the supervision of the large dairy on the home farm and a flock of pedigree Shropshire sheep.

While at Moncrieffe, Mr Gavin received the important appointment of factor on Falkland estate, succeeding in that office the late Major Wood, who factored the property for 32 years, and occupying as his residence a part of the Royal and ancient Palace of Falkland. Mr Gavin discharged the duties pertaining to the office with judicious care and efficiency, and proved a valuable public servant, whose obliging disposition gained him wide respect. He was a member of Falkland Parish Council, a member of the Executive Committee of the County Council, and served his term of three years as a Director of the Fife Agricultural Society, of which he was a vice-President. He was a member of the local Committee for the Highland Show at Cupar in 1912, and a member of the Royal Scottish Arboricultural Society's Committee in charge of the arrangements for the Forestry Exhibition in the showyard. Mr Gavin was an active member of Cupar District Committee.

With the social life of Falkland, Mr Gavin had much to do. The fetes connected with the coming-of-age of the late Lord Ninian Crichton-Stuart, M.P., (who was killed in the Great War), his Lordship's marriage, the birth of a son and heir, and the homecoming of Lord and Lady Ninian and their young son were all admirably carried out under the direction of Mr Gavin, and reflected great credit on his organising skill and ability. Last autumn, when Her Majesty the Queen visited Falkland Palace, and was received by the Hon. Mrs Maule Ramsay, Mr Gavin made all the arrangements for that event, which will become historic. Mr Gavin was presented to Her Majesty. In the lifetime of Lord Ninian, Falkland Golf Club were given a fine site for their Clubhouse mainly through Mr Gavin's representations to his Lordship. Mrs Gavin died in 1914. Mr Gavin's only son is in Nigeria. The eldest of his four daughters was married to Mr W. Gilmour Leburn, Gateside House, on 11th July 1922. The young couple proceeded to Hamburg, Germany, where Mr Leburn was engaged in business. They returned last autumn, accompanied by the late Mr Gavin, who crossed over to Hamburg, and spent a few weeks there. An interview with them regarding the position of Germany was published in this journal in November.

The funeral takes place today (Friday), at 1.30 p.m.)"

Article in *The Fife News:* Funeral of the Late Mr George Gavin, Factor of Falkland Estate:

"A large and representative gathering of friends and the public attended the Chapel at Falkland Palace on Friday afternoon to pay their last respects to Mr George Gavin. A short service was held in the chapel, and the officiating clergymen were Father Connolly, Lochgelly, and Father McNamara, Perth. The coffin was then conveyed to the hearse by the employees on the estate. On arrival at the private burial ground at House of Falkland about 1.30 p.m., eight of the tenantry carried the remains to the graveside. The pall-bearers were: -

Mr W.G. Leburn (son-in-law), Mr Nath Gavin, Manchester (brother), Mr R. Gavin, Glasgow (brother), Mr MacDonald, Perth (brother-in-law), Captain A. Maule Ramsay, House of Falkland, Lord Collum Crichton-Stuart, M.P., Mr David Bonthrone, Newton of Falkland, Dr J.G. Jack, Glasgow.

Among the many floral tributes were those from the tenantry, the employees of the estate, and Southfield Hospital, Auchtermuchty. The Town Council, Parish Council, and County Council were all represented at the funeral."

"Freuchie Rovers had Falkland as their opponents in a Cupar and District League match on Freuchie Park last Saturday. Falkland, judged by their play, seemed to have lacked opportunities for practice lately, and we have no doubt that with an improvement in this direction they would give more effective opposition. As it was, Wilkie scored for Freuchie off a penalty almost at the start, and within the first half the home team put on another three goals, 2 by Henderson and 1 by Ferguson. After changing, Henderson put on another goal, thus performing the hat trick, and Wilkie also put on a second goal off a corner. Forrester in goal for Freuchie had one or two visitors, but for long stretches was left without company.



Winning the toss, Burntisland elected to bat, and the opening pair, W. Brand and J. Pollands, faced the bowling of J. Ross and J. Allan. Five runs were on the board when the first wicket fell, Pollands being clean bowled by Allan. Adamson came in first wicket down, but did not stay long, as he was out to a finely taken catch by Shields in the longfields, off Ross's bowling. Lawson followed, and left without any addition to the score, being dismissed by a rather loose one from Allan. Brand and Sugden were now together, and runs were coming at a steady pace until the former was run out, due to a smart return from Schofield. The following four batsmen were all out for 'ducks', but it seemed the 'rot' had been stopped when Rarity and Sugden became partners. This was not the case, however, as the latter, after contributing 11, was bowled by Ross. Anderson and Rarity only put on 6 for the last wicket when Rarity was out to a well-taken catch by Schofield at leg. The innings closed for 35.

C.R. Drysdale and J. Shields opened for Falkland, and 10 runs were signalled before Shields was caught behind the wicket. Lawson now partnered Drysdale, and commenced fireworks right away by opening with a nicely played 4 on the leg side. The former was now hitting out to some tune, and the visitors' score was passed by eight runs when Adamson clean bowled Drysdale, who, although his contribution was only 3, had played steady cricket. T. Drysdale and Stark were dismissed without breaking their 'ducks', and then a long and profitable partnership ensued with Lawson and R. Hopkins, before the former was out to a doubtful lbw decision, after a well-compiled 29. Allan was caught by Pollands after scoring 9, and Schofield along with Hopkins gave the fielders some leather-hunting, till the latter, in attempting to turn a ball to leg, was held by Brand. The Provost came in eighth wicket down and though only scoring 5, had quite a spell at the wicket. The innings closed at 101 for nine wickets. "Through the kindness of the Lumsden Bursary Trustees, the pupils attending the Supplementary Classes at Freuchie and Falkland Schools enjoyed a trip to Edinburgh last Saturday. To the number of about fifty, they entrained in the morning at Falkland Road Station, accompanied by four of their teachers, and in due time reached the Metropolis. From the Waverley Station, they walked via Princes Street Gardens, the Mound, High Street, and South Bridge to the Royal Scottish Museum in Chambers Street, receiving explanations en route of the various objects of interest.

At the Museum, the party was divided, the boys taking the Engineering Hall, where the greatest interest was evinced in the exhibits showing the development of the bicycle, aeroplane, etc., whilst the girls were shown the needlework, tapestry, etc. Both sexes united to be taken through the natural history collection, and last and most popular of all was the display of historical treasures, such as Queen Mary's cradle, James V's bed, carved oak chair from Falkland Palace, Cavalier lace collars, Queen Mary's needlework, and the last letter written by Queen Mary. A very special item, shown by the kindness of the head attendant, was the recently discovered part

of the city wall which was being erected at the time of Flodden, on which the marks of hurried work subsequent to the battle were plainly discernible.

On leaving the Museum, a first-class dinner was enjoyed in the well-known Patrick Thomson's restaurant, after which the youngsters were taken by tramway cars to the Zoo, where the living animals created intense interest, possibly the most popular items being the Polar bears, in their picturesque surroundings, and the sea lions. At the conclusion of the sight-seeing here, tea was partaken off in the Zoo tea-rooms. Thence the return was made by car to the Haymarket Station, and so home, which was reached, the trippers tired, but happy, about seven o'clock.

Of the educational value of the trip there can be no doubt, and great credit is due to the Lumsden Trust, which provided the finances, to Major J.L. Lumsden, who took a keen personal interest in promoting the arrangements, and to the teachers, who took upon themselves the rather onerous task of piloting the young people on their journey.

The excursion was somewhat of the nature of an experiment, and of its success there can be no doubt."

A railwayman states that when the train was a short distance from Markinch Station, he observed a woman standing at the open door of one of the carriages. The deceased had a niece at Edinburgh, with whom she frequently resided."

Kirkby and Ross opened for Kennoway, and, as was the case with the visitors, found it difficult to collect runs. With the exception of Kirkby, the batsmen could not master the Falkland bowling, and seven wickets had fallen for 14 runs when Lister stopped the 'rot'. Kirkby and he began to hit out a bit, and the score was taken to 38 before Lister played on to his wicket. Just after this, time was called, and Falkland were deprived of what seemed to be victory. 



Among the Ecclefechan memories is a story which Dr Arnott, 'the only English physician acceptable to Napoleon in his last illness', was fond of telling to Carlyle and his other friends, and one which, we are informed, has never before been printed: -

'Napoleon wanted his heart to be taken by Dr Antommarchi to his widow, and at the post-mortem, it was put in spirits in a silver vase to that purpose. But Governor Hudson Lowe ordered Antommarchi to bury the heart with the body. So the silver vase had to be put in the coffin and was buried — only not the heart, at least not the heart of Napoleon. It passed into an insignificant-looking glass jar, and was in Dr

Arnott's cabin on his voyage home. One stormy night, a smashing sound awakened the doctor. He rose to make sure of the most precious of his possessions, and found the glass jar broken. Hastily lighting a candle, he was in time to see the heart of Napoleon in the jaws of a rat; but whether he was able to retrieve it remains unknown.'

The above Dr Arnott was an ancestor of the late Mr Arnott, tenant farmer of Newton of Lathrisk, and left an interesting record of his many interviews with Napoleon."

"The historic burgh of Falkland was the scene on Saturday afternoon of an interesting pageant, organised in aid of the local nursing funds. Ideal weather favoured the function, and there was a large entry, comprising ingenious and picturesque costumes. The Hon. Mrs Maule Ramsay, House of Falkland; Mrs Currie, Millfield; and Mrs James Jackson, Chapelyard, Falkland, found the task of allocating the prizes no easy one.

Shortly before the time arranged for the judging to take place, the old square in front of the palace was alive with the 'silk and motley' of the competitors. The vivid garments of gipsy girls and pierettes rubbed shoulders with graceful Court ladies and stately crinolined damsels.

There was a fair proportion of children among the entrants, and with commendable kindness, the Committee in charge of the arrangements had provided special consolation prizes for all children, in addition to the prizes awarded for outstanding merit in regard to costumes.

Mrs Brown and Mrs Birrell, Falkland, were joint-Conveners of the Committee, who comprised members of the Falkland Ladies' Club.

#### Prize Winners:

First prize for the most original costume among the ladies was awarded to Miss A. Edmiston, who was smartly dressed in the black and yellow garb of a 'Jester'. Miss Lexie Findlay, as a dainty 'Sweet Lavender' won second prize in this section; and Miss Jean Sturrock, who represented that well-known paper 'Our Dogs', was third.

As a 'Glaxo Baby', Miss Craig, Glasgow, won first prize in the humorous section. Second place was given to Miss M. Dryburgh, and Miss D. Young, who came as female tramps, with a perambulator crammed with balloons and tin ware. Mrs Nicoll, Freuchie, who won third prize, was a witch, with the inevitable broom-stick and black cat.

The most original gentleman was Mr A. Dakers, who came as a mounted cowboy, with black sheep-skin trousers, revolver, and sombrero. Second place was won by

Messrs John Robb and John Nicoll, Freuchie, who were the mysterious 'Klu-Klux-Klan'. Mr Wm. Robertson, whose costume was that of a Guard's officer in 1830, was awarded third prize.

In the humorous section, Kate Skinner was first, in a bath towel garment, as 'Ancient Order of the Bath'; second, Kate Lawson as a bride; with her bridegroom, Maggie Thomson, third.

The most original boy's costume was 'Vim', that of Jackie Anderson. The second place was given to W. Dryburgh, who came as a 'Zulu', with scanty garments and a skin shield. The third prize winner was Joe Wardrop, a 'Mexican'.

The most humorous boy's impersonation was that of David Gourlay, Kirkcaldy, who dressed as a jockey, was mounted on a Shetland pony. A delightful 'Boy Blue', the winner of the second prize, was Kennedy Drysdale, and the third prize was given to Robert Craig, a little quack doctor.

Among girls under nine years, the first prize was given to Muriel Hain, Freuchie, who was 'Felix'. Miss Nelly Bett, as 'Yes, We Have No Bananas', won second prize, and Jenny Hepburn, as a 'Fairy Queen', and Jenny Stark, a butterfly, were third equal.

## **Prize-Giving Ceremony:**

Mr Charles Oram, Falkland, presided at the prize-giving ceremony, which was performed in one of the lovely parks of Falkland House by Mrs Maule Ramsay. Mrs Maule Ramsay, who was accompanied by her two daughters, the Hon. Ismay and Claudia Crichton Stuart, and the Dowager Marchioness of Bute, was wearing a fawn suit, striped with lemon, and with an accordion-pleated skirt. Her white tagel cloche hat was ornamented with feathers. Miss Ismay came in a poudre bleu wool suit, and a cyclamen Bangkok hat, while Miss Claudia's woollen frock was striped with grey, to match her grey summer felt. Over a grey silk gown, pin-striped with black, the Marchioness of Bute wore a black charmeuse cloak with a white fox collar. Her black toque was ornamented with jet. Master Michael Crichton Stuart, the heir to Falkland House, was also of the party.

On the motion of Mr T. Drysdale, votes of thanks were accorded the judges and others who had helped to make the function a success.

#### Side-Shows:

Various side-shows in the park were organised by Mr R. Wallace. Those in charge of the entertainments were Messrs C. Oram, J. Ross, David Cowan, James Skinner, and Herbert Robson. Mr Wm. Robertson, Falkland, was the human 'Aunt Sally' at one of the booths.

In the 'art gallery', some of the works of art were decidedly amusing. 'Antique lace, very rare', was an old leather bootlace, 'The Queen's Bodyguard' was a pair of corsets; and 'The Grub that makes the Butterfly', bread.

Tea was served under one of the stately old trees, by a band of ladies. These were:

Mrs Birrell (convener), the Misses Anderson, Misses Lawson, Findlay, Ashton, Thomson, Kennedy, Edmiston, Grant, Drysdale, and J. Kennedy.

Kingskettle Silver Band, under the leadership of Mr R. Adams, played the fancy dress procession up to the park, and subsequently provided music for a dance, which was held in the evening.

## Costumes and their Wearers:

The spectacular effect of the whole parade, seen en masse, was particularly good. Among the many attractive costumes, a few deserve special mention. As an early Victorian lady. Miss Lizzie Nelson wore a brown silk crinoline and a real old Paisley shawl. A fitting partner was Miss Cathie Hardie, in frock coat and 'tile'. A tricky 'Willie Winkie' was Willie Skinner. Miss A. Oswald came as a Victorian flower seller. in a quaint flowered gown and beribboned bonnet. Master M. Stark, as 'After the Match', represented a somewhat decrepit footballer. John Bett gave a good impersonation of the 'Order of the Bath'. Two little flower girls, with fragrant baskets of blossoms, were Bella and Anna Dryburgh. Mr T. Paterson, as the 'Wild Man of Borneo', drove up in a motor car with an enormous white stuffed dog as a mascot. The ever-popular 'Jackie Coogan' was impersonated by Masters T. Page and D. McBean, and Master T. Honeyman was a 'Balloon Boy'. His elder brother, J. Honeyman, came as a shepherd. John Morgan, Freuchie, was a tinker, with a plentiful supply of tin-ware; and James Kinnear, Freuchie, was a somewhat dilapidated tramp piper. A convincing cowboy was Joseph Wardrop, Kirkcaldy; and a miniature Red Indian was Patsy Wardrop. Isobel Love came as a 'Red Cross Nurse', Isa Dakers was a flower girl; and John Lawson, a small, 'absent-minded beggar', had forgotten his trousers. Another 'absent-minded beggar' was A. Meldrum.

#### A Wounded Soldier:

J. Dakers came as a Dutch boy, and John Walker was a wounded soldier in hospital blue. A formidable 'Bill Sykes' was J. Mather; and Finlay Drysdale came as 'The

Dude', in frock-coat, tall hat, and immaculate white spats. A bright costume, entitled 'Balloon Girl', was worn by Mary Jane Thomson. Mary Lawson was a kilted Scotsman. As 'Bonnie Scotland', Miss Betsy Dryburgh wore a pretty black frock and hat plentifully bestrewed with Scotch thistles.
